Hoffman Dies at Waukesha

A. of C. Secretary Is Survived by Wife and 7 Children

Waukesha - B. A. Hoffman, 38 secretary of the Waukesha Association of Commerce and former city treasurer, died at 8 a. m. Monday, following a short illness. He is survived by his wife and seven children, the oldest 12 and youngest 6 months old. They are Eunice, Bernard, Ruth, Jerome, James, Phillip and

Mary Jeannette. Mr. Hoffman was forced to resign as city treasurer one month ago because of ill health, but he retained his position as Association of Commerce secretary, expecting to take only a short leave of absence. He was suffering from Bright's disease.

Mr. Hoffman came to Waukesha from Milwaukee, where he was bureau manager for the United Press. He was manager of the Wau-kesha Freeman for several years. He was employed by The Milwaukee Journal for a short time and spent two years in Delavan with a news-paper there. He returned to Waukesha three years ago as secretary of the Association of Commerce.

Besides being editor of the Rotary club Revolver, a weekly publication, he served as secretary of the local Red Cross. He had been active in civic and political affairs.

After being a patient at the Spa,

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local sanatorium, until one week ago he was removed to his home at Mc-Call st. and Hartwell av.

Funeral arrangements have not been made, but the services will probably be held at St. Joseph's Catholic church, where Mr. Hoffman was a member of the choir and other organizations, with burial at Stevens

In Newspaper Work

The deceased grew to maturity in Stevens Point, attending the local schools and graduating from the High school. During his youthful days he served as school correspondent for The Gazette and was later ampleyed as accorder for a swiftemployed as reporter for a considerable length of time.

After leaving here Mr. Hoffman took up newspaper work with the Oshkosh Northwestern at Oshkosh, serving for several years as tell graph editor. Subsequently he was connected with Milwaukee papers and with the United Press, which he represented as bureau manager at Milwaukee. From the United Press he went to Waukesha as editor of the Waukesha Dally Free-man following the consolidation of the Daily Herald, weekly Freeman and weekly Dispatch. Two or three years later he went to Delavan as editor of a weekly newspaper, but not long afterward returned to Waukesha to become service. retary of the Chamber of Commerce. Elected City Treasurer
